# San Bernardino County Fire moves to expand coverage; property owners could pay \$157 a year in new tax


After years of relying on the county's general fund to help cover the cost of its services, the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District is asking property owners in all of the county's unincorporated communities to pay up.

Fire officials want property owners in some parts of the county to pay a parcel tax of up to \$157 a year as part of a proposal to create a steady revenue stream for the district, which this year is facing a budget shortfall of \$29 million.

"For as long as I can remember we've operated at a deficit," said County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig. "As a taxing authority, we should be able to stand on our own."

To get that money, the fire district is hoping to impose the tax without a vote.

Hartwig has been hosting community meetings on the proposal to expand the fire protection service zone known as FP-5 to include all unincorporated areas before mailing out notices on Sept. 15.

"My goal is for everybody to have as much information as I can give them," Hartwig said. "This was my idea to my fire board. I'm taking the opportunity to get out to the community and present it myself."

After the notices are issued, property owners who oppose the tax have until Oct. 16 to submit written protests that could put the tax question to voters. In order to trigger an election, 25 percent of property owners who control at least 25 percent of the assessed land value would need to file written protests. To stop the tax, more than 50 percent would have to oppose it in writing.

The tax process, which follows rules set by the Local Agency Formation Commission, proved controversial a year ago, when Upland moved to join the district.

While some residents support the fire agency's expansion, others question a process that requires property owners to file written opposition to stop it or bring it before all voters.

"When you put a system into place that basically disenfranchises people, which is how I feel this is, I just don't feel it's right," said Laura Dyberg, president of the Mountain Rim Fire Safe Council, who added that she wasn't speaking for her organization.

"That's a whole separate issue from whether or not they need the money, and whether or not they need the \$157 a year."

### Upside down

Revenue from property taxes, contracts and fire protection service zones have not been enough to cover the district's rising costs, Hartwig said, and the agency increasingly has relied more on county general funds and its own reserves.

Also, the county's more populous communities, and those already paying a fee for services, are subsidizing communities that are less populated and more remote.

This year, the district is again relying on its reserves and an estimated \$17.4 million through its agreement with the county.

In June, when Hartwig presented his budget to the Board of Supervisors, he offered three options to pay for future operations – continue using general funds, dramatically cut services, or expand the fire protection zone and collect money from property owners.

The board voted 3-2 to initiate the process of expanding the fire coverage zone, with an eye on collecting more money from property owners.

"We cannot continue to subsidize the high quality fire response times and services on the back of the general fund because it means other really important projects that we would have otherwise funded are not being completed and

not being delivered," said Fifth District Supervisor Josie Gonzales, who joined Supervisors Curt Hagman and James Ramos in voting for the expansion.

Gonzales said it is important to tell property owners how much fire services cost today versus how much those same services cost when their property taxes were set.

The expansion, if approved as proposed, would generate an additional \$26.9 million in revenue for the fire district, leaving it about \$2.4 million short of projected costs. Hartwig said such a budget would leave little room to improve services.

"I think my focus, more than anything, is to maintain the services that we have," Hartwig said. "That's the best way for me to look at it. And I'm hopeful that this revenue stream can be used as communities grow, to improve services."

Second District Supervisor Janice Rutherford, who opposed the proposal because the process didn't include a direct vote, said the fire agency needs to let voters decide on the quality of fire services they are willing to pay for.

"There's a disconnect, and that disconnect has come about because the fire district and the board of supervisors have assumed that people want a high level of service," Rutherford said.

"If people still want that level of service, they need to be willing to pay more. If they're not willing to pay more, they need to understand what the new level of service is going to be."

#### Who pays

If protests do not meet the 25 percent threshold, and if the Board of Supervisors gives final approval of the expansion in October, all the county's unincorporated communities would be brought into the zone.

The proposed expansion has caused some frustration among Grand Terrace officials, who recently pulled a proposed public safety measure from the November ballot that would have charged property owners a parcel tax to pay for sheriff's services.

Several unincorporated communities in the county, including Helendale and San Antonio Heights, and cities of San Bernardino, Needles, Twentynine Palms and Upland, are already covered by the fire district.

Communities not in the zone that pay a fee for fire services would have to start paying the \$157 parcel tax. That tax, which would be paid by property owners, could go up by as much as 3 percent a year.

For some property owners in the communities in question, the new tax could represent a big change from what they currently pay for fire protection.

In Red Mountain, the \$157 a year tax would mean a drop from their current bill, which is \$192.47. But in Havasu Lake, where property owners currently pay \$139.59 a year, and in El Mirage, they pay \$9, the new rate would be higher.

In Mentone, property owners currently don't pay any fee. But Leonette DiMuro, a member of the Mentone Area Community Association who attended a recent community meeting on the issue, was more concerned to hear about the repairs needed at their local fire station than the fee.

"If they can give us an idea of what they need, maybe we can do a fundraiser just for that," she said, adding that she is comfortable paying the fee and supports the community's firefighters.

"I think they need the expansion," DiMuro said. "I'm just talking about the local community doing something for the local firefighters that we love and care about."

Mountain Rim's Dyberg, who has worked with fire agencies for 20 years, said she has supported previous increases for fire agencies. But the question now is about fiscal responsibility, she said. The fire district, in her view, needs to do a better job of showing why it needs the money.

"Just because someone's a firefighter or a police officer, you don't turn the other way and give them whatever they want."

#### A controversial process

When Upland became part of the county fire zone a year ago, as a way to save money, a decision by LAFCO to also include the unincorporated community of San Antonio Heights as part of that change led to contentious public meetings and court challenges that have yet to be resolved.

Heights residents went to court, describing the annexation — which included an annual \$150-plus parcel tax — as taxation without representation. A hearing on the issue is set for Nov. 9 in San Bernardino County Superior Court.

"I cautioned my colleagues on the board when we debated this that they should learn that lesson from the (San Antonio) Heights experience as well," Rutherford said.

State law allows the expansion of the fire zone through a public hearing process. Hartwig, however, asked the board to also hold a written protest process as a way to better measure the opposition.

Here's how that process works:

Every property owner can submit a written protest. If two people own a property, and both are opposed to the expansion, each would need to submit a protest to reflect their views.

If 25 percent of all property owners protest, their collective vote would also need to represent 25 percent of the assessed value of the area in question.

For example, if a 10 percent owner of a \$100,000 parcel submits a valid protest to the expansion, it would be counted as one protest with \$10,000 assessed value. If a husband and wife co-own a \$500,000 house, but only the husband submits a protest, it would count as a single protest with \$250,000 assessed value, according to County Fire Cpt. Steven Tracy.

Validation and tabulation of the protest forms will be done by a third-party contractor and calculation of the assessed value will take place during tabulation, Tracy added.

The Board of Supervisors, however, retains the option to call for an election even if the hard numbers fall short of the 25 percent opposition, said David Wert, county spokesman, via email.

#### What's next?

Notices will be mailed to property owners Sept. 15.

Property owners against the expansion must mail in their written opposition by the close of business Oct. 15, or submit a written form, in person, by the end of the public hearing Oct. 16.

The public hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. Oct. 16 at the government center, 385 N. Arrowhead Ave., San Bernardino.

If approved, the tax would start generating revenue for the district in 2019.

The FP-5 service zone assessment was previously approved by voters when it was created. Therefore, Prop 218 does not apply with the approved resolution to expand the Service Zone FP-5. Health and Safety code 13800 gives the governing board of a Fire District the authority to expand an existing Service Zone to maintain or improve services within the Fire District. The Government code stipulates all that's required to expand the Service Zone is a majority vote of the Districts Board, notification to the property owners, and a public hearing. The Protest period was proposed by the Fire Chief to the Board as a means for the Fire Board to gauge public opinion regarding the expansion of Service Zone FP-5. The Fire Board approved the Chiefs proposal and adopted the LAFCO protest process in the resolution.





It makes sense that 25% of parcel owners (plus 1) must protest, and that the value of their parcels must exceed 25% of the assessed value of all parcels in the affected area.

After reading it several times, it doesn't seem to exactly say that, making one wonder how a lawyer might argue this in court.

It may be moot, I'm not sure the whole grab is entirely legal. More in a separate message.

## Everyone's got to give

There are no easy answers in the question of whether property owners should agree to pay a new yearly assessment for fire services. But a couple of things are clear: The fire department is more important than ever, and money is tighter than ever.

We appreciate the fire service and understand why they need more money. The cost of doing business is higher than ever. Raises in minimum wage and fuel costs alone make it more expensive to run any operation, much less something as complex as the fire service.

We all understand that.

And in exchange, the people of the Morongo Basin need the leaders in San Bernardino County to understand that in this area, there are people who simply cannot afford to pay another \$157 a year.

The fees and taxes that landowners pay already amount to quite a lot. It's their hard-earned money, and it's even harder when you think about how slowly, if at all, this area is recovering from the recession.

But the sad fact is it's also not enough to meet all the expenses of a modern firefighting, medical response and rescue operation.

Look at what the fire department is expected to do in 2018. No longer is it firefighting only. It's running medical calls 24 hours a day, pumping blood and breath into people who are dying in their homes. It's tearing the roofs off of crushed vehicles to rescue people from collisions and keep them alive on the way to the hospital. It's stabilizing people overdosing on opiates. And yes, it's strapping on oxygen tanks and 40 pounds of turnout gear and striding into burning buildings to save people and animals and extinguish the flames.

In the post-9-11 world, it also includes preparing and possibly responding to terrorist attacks.

Its no surprise that the costs in manpower, equipment, training and supplies are more than they were decades ago when the fees and taxes were set.

But it should also come as no surprise to county leaders that many of the people scrabbling out a living in the desert simply do not have any extra dollars to give.

The fire department has shut down paid-call stations in the Homestead Valley communities and Pioneertown, the Wonder Valley station is closed at least temporarily and the Desert Heights station has been closed for years. This month, Hartwig said he'd like to move the Yucca Mesa station closer to Yucca Valley. In the face of all these shuttered stations, proposing a new \$157 fee is going to feel like a punch in the face to rural residents.

The people of the Morongo Basin want to commit to the fire service, but what commitment can the fire service make to rural residents who have seen their fire stations disappear one by one? Property owners will have the chance to vote against the fee proposal. If it fails, we hope the fire service will come back with a more progressive tax plan that won't hit low-income homeowners as hard, and with a plan to provide closer services to remote areas.

Whether this proposal succeeds or fails, what is clear is that the fire department has to do something to better serve the remote areas, and the people of those areas have to accept that at some point, the rest of the county may stop subsidizing their fire services.

Something has to give.



I have reviewed all the question cards from the last two weeks Outreach meetings. The following are some Q and A's I would like to have added to our website factsheet as well as the handouts based on the most frequent questions being asked by the public. Please review these for accuracy and content and get back to me. I would like to have these added as soon as possible. Thank you!

## Additional Q and A to be added to the web-site and Hand-outs

Q: Is there an exact breakdown where this assessment money will go? How can I see what you're spending our money on today?

A: All special service assessments are restricted funds by State Law and can only to be spent within the named Service Zone they were collected for. A full disclosure of the Fire District's budget can be found on our website at www.sbcfire.org under the "About" tab.

Q: The resolution to expand the Service Zone FP-5 states the assessment increases up to 3% each year. Is there a total cap on how much the assessment can go up to?

A: No, the assessment can be increased up to 3% a year based on the recommendation of the District's Fire Chief. This recommendation would be based on current operating budget short falls, increases in daily and yearly operating cost, cost of living increases (CPI), and MOU contracts. Any recommendation made by the Fire Chief to increase the Service Zone fee must be approved by the District's Board of Directors. The Service Zone FP-5 assessment does NOT automatically increase every year.

Q: Is this expansion and the FP-5 property assessment due to rising pension cost?

A: No, this is about the total cost of providing fire and emergency medical services. Those costs include facilities, vehicle replacement, equipment, salaries, pensions, etc. It's also important to remember that SBCERA, the County's retirement system, is in much better shape than other public retirement systems like CAL PERS, which has received a lot of attention over the past few years for its unfortunate financial difficulties.





# San Bernardino County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig Discusses Proposed Fire Tax at a Community Meeting.

Lake Arrowhead, CA – At a community meeting held Tuesday, August 14, 2018, at Rim of the World High School, San Bernardino County Fire Chief, Mark Hartwig discussed the proposal of a new fire tax for Service Zone FP-5. The tax will include all of the Service Zones in the County Fire area. These are all unincorporated areas of the County.

Chief Hartwig explained the tax is expected to increase revenue for the San Bernardino County Fire District by about \$27 million. A \$29 million deficit is expected in 2019 and this tax is aimed at relieving that.

The San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors, who operate as the board for the county's fire district, were approached by Chief Hardwick who gave then 3 options to relieve the deficite.

First option is to operate within their current revenue, which is at a deficit. Second option to have the board guarantee \$17 million from the general fund, which the county has no legal obligation to provide. His third option is to expand FP-5 costing taxpayers more money.

After Hartwig's recommendations, the board decided in a 3-2 vote to pursue the expansion of FP-5.

Supervisor Janice Rutherford — one of the supervisors who voted against the proposal — had this to say in a statement.

"I believe voters should have the right to affirmatively decide whether this tax should apply to their property, and the process the Board adopted does not guarantee voters will have that opportunity. I also believe it is appropriate to have a public conversation about what level of fire (and) emergency services can be provided with the Fire District's existing tax revenue, so voters fully understand how funding shortfalls would impact staffing levels, response time, etc."

Chief Hartwig said they do have an algorithm which can predict response times, should a fire station close due to lack of funding. In our mountain communities they expect an increase of 36 minutes.

"I believe this is our best option", Hartwig said, "I'm asking a lot of every community".

If the proposal passes, it is important to note the tax is per parcel. So homeowners that have more than one parcel will pay more than the \$157.26 proposed tax.

For homeowners that also own parcels that are contiguous, there's a form online which can be filled out and taken to the county assessor. After submitting the form and paying a one-time fee of \$108, the county treats the property as a single parcel for the purpose of this tax. 

## Water, fire major issues in Lucerne Valley

Water and fire issues in LV

The Lucerne Valley Economic Development Association meeting last Tuesday focused on several agenda items, major ones relating to two of Earth's basic elements: Fire and water. Here's a recap of the discussions on both.

#### Water

The Mojave Water Agency has created an ad hoc well committee to form a link between the agency that doles out water/pumping rights and San Bernardino County, which issues the well permits.

Creation of the committee was borne of concern that some residents may be pumping and exceeding their allowable annual water usage of 10 acre-feet per year, and not paying for the overage (adjudicated water rights) as required, said Richard Selby, vice president of LVEDA and California Rural Water Association field specialist for the agency.

Conservation of water is especially important when it is not replenished adequately by natural sources.

"Let's face it, water is getting very precious. We go into droughts," Selby said. "We don't have magic rainfall. We don't even have enough snow on the mountains to give us much recharge of the water we use. So we have to be concerned about how we use it."

The committee is intended to more closely scrutinize the reasons for a well being constructed in the first place.

Prohibition of hauled water also has been contentious for this rural community.

Even though Sacramento enacted the prohibition state-wide only recently, at the beginning of 2018, it had been an unwritten "internal policy" of the county for several years prior, said LVEDA President Chuck Bell said in an email response.

The law states that no building permits will be issued for construction of a new residential development where the source of water is hauled.

Bell sees this as a "property right taking" because in many rural desert and mountain communities, hauled water may be the only option.

Wells are expensive to build and operate and the probability of even tapping into usable groundwater is marginal, he said in the email.

LVEDA is working with a legal foundation to provide a test case that will challenge the prohibition.

### Fire

The San Bernardino County Fire Department is proposing to levy an annual parcel tax of \$157.26, with a possible 3 percent increase annually, on all property owners within unincorporated areas of the county. Vacant parcels are not excluded.

Expanding the department's Service Zone FP-5, additional revenues would be used to help offset a \$29 million deficit, officials say.

This is not set in stone however, said Mark Lundquist, field representative for Third District Supervisor James Ramos.

Public notices will be sent out to property owners Sept. 14, and if at least 25 percent protest, the proposal would be placed on ballot and require a 50-plus one majority to approve it, he told attendees.

A majority of protest votes would terminate it outright also.

The Lucerne Valley/Johnson Valley Municipal Advisory Council meeting at 5 p.m. Thursday will host county Fire Chief Mark Hartwig, who will talk and answer questions about the proposed parcel tax expansion.

Roger Peterson, MAC chairperson, encouraged residents to bring their friends and family members to pack the Community Center and let their voices and feedback be heard.

Another group is also hoping that voices and feedback will be heard.

Representatives for the California Opportunity Study are conducting research by interviewing 40 randomly selected families in the area.

Their mission is to understand how people make ends meet in America, listen to their stories, and lend some context to dehumanized data points and figures, hopefully influencing decision makers of public policy, they said.

The comprehensive study, sponsored by the Stanford Center on Poverty & Inequality and Princeton University, will sample a broad range of socioeconomic households.

It will also seek to understand the "challenges of raising children, finding unemployment and juggling work and home responsibilities, as well as what it's like to live in California these days," according to the website.

The representatives, who are also college students, have only received about six to seven responses from the sample size in Lucerne Valley so far.

This has not affected their enthusiasm, however.

In response to one attendee's conjecture that the limited response from the selected residents might be all they receive, one of the women replied: "We are not giving up."




# San Bernardino County Fire Chief says changes needed to meet budget shortfall

San Bernardino County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig makes his pitch to Big River residents to expand a service zone within the county to include almost the entire county. He said this was needed to increase revenue to meet a budget shortfall.



Under the proposal, the current FP-5 service zone will be expanded from several small areas in the southern part of the county to all the shaded areas.

the FP-5 service zone within the county fire district to cover almost the entire county. Hartwig said the department is currently looking at a \$29 million shortfall, and expanding the FP-5 zone would increase revenue while spreading the tax burden more evenly. He said it would allow the department to keep services at their current levels.

The current FP-5 consists of small, unconnected areas located mostly in the southern part of the county. The expanded FP-5 would include all unincorporated areas of the county, except those already receiving fire and emergency medical service from other districts. It would also include the cities of Grand Terrace and Upland, and the town of Yucca Valley.

Hartwig told the attendees at the Big River Community Services District office that this was one of about 25 meetings they have scheduled between July and mid-October.

San Bernardino County is the largest county in the nation, covering 19,000 square miles. With a population of 2.4 million, it is the 12<sup>th</sup> most populated county. Approximately half the residents are served by the county fire district. The others are served by municipalities that have their own fire departments, communities that contract for fire services, and those that are served by special districts.

The county fire district is a separate entity from the county, but the county supervisors serve as the fire board. The district currently has three revenue sources: property taxes, service zones where residents pay extra for fire or paramedic service, and Memorandum of Understanding with San Bernardino County for service enhancements.

Hartwig said the property tax revenue is insufficient for the department, and they have been spending their reserves, up to \$11.9 million in the FY 2018-19 budget.

"We can't live off our reserves anymore," he said.

He said the County Supervisors are under no obligation to provide funding, but they have done so every year. For the current fiscal year, that's \$17.4 million. Hartwig said this is a year-to-year arrangement, and it's dependent on the county having the funds to provide to the department.

"We're at the mercy of the general fund," he said.

Hartwig acknowledged many areas of the county are underserved, including the Colorado River Corridor. Among other things, he said Big River needs a full-time engine at their station. They are currently staffed by volunteers, or "Paid Call Firefighters." He added the county supervisors agree with him.

"They haven't disagreed with me on the need," he said. "They tell me there's no money."

The department's administration concluded expanding FP-5 would be the best way to increase revenue.

According to information provided by the department, the benefits of FP-5 expansion include establishing sustainable capital improvement funds, eliminating the special fees for fire and paramedic service, establish a consistent tax rate throughout the county, and allow the department to maintain the current level of services.

"I'm asking people to allow me to generate revenue so we can keep up services," Hartwig said. "I'm asking for your support so I can provide a sustainable fire district."

Hartwig said notices would be sent out to all property owners on Sept. 14. Letters protesting the proposed FP-5 expansion will be accepted until the close of business Oct. 15. A public hearing and possible adoption of the proposed expansion will be held at 10 a.m. Oct. 16 at the San Bernardino County Government Center.



# Fire chief says department needs more money

YUCCA VALLEY — Fire Chief Mark Hartwig visited the Yucca Valley Community Center Wednesday night to discuss the possibility of expanding Fire Protection Service Zone 5 to cover every community in the county that is not served by its own private fire department, like Victorville or Morongo Valley, or cities that already fall under FP5 like Twentynine Palms, Needles and Upland.

The purpose of the expansion is to increase revenue to the county fire department, which has been operating over budget for the past few years and has had to ask the county board of supervisors to fill the gap using money from the general fund. Last year the deficit was \$11.9 million.

"We have two problems currently in the fire district," Hartwig said. "We survive off of revenue that we don't generate within the fire district and when we do have areas that generate enough money, like Yucca Valley, they require better services and better facilities."

If the service zone is expanded, property owners will be charged \$157.26 per year regardless of the value of their property. This will be in addition to the current amount of property taxes that are already allocated to the fire department in some parts of the county.

"You pay me a part of your property tax," Hartwig said. "Here in Yucca Valley that's 22 percent of your property taxes and in Joshua Tree it's 10 percent."

The new fee, however, will replace fire protection assessments charged in some parts of the county. For example, Wonder Valley property owners pay \$35 a year, while others pay \$100 more than that.

The projected revenue from this charge, if passed, is about \$27 million per year. The fee could be increased by as much as 3 percent each year by a vote of the board of supervisors.

"If FP5 were to go through, that would only generate \$26.9 million, which is still a \$2.4 million deficit," Hartwig said. "If it does not go through, then the projected 2019-2020 shortfall would be \$32.3 million."

Hartwig said his first priority for Yucca Valley if the expansion passes is to move the Yucca Mesa station closer to Twentynine Palms Highway.

"Right now the response times to areas like Landers are almost exactly the same between the Yucca Valley and the Yucca Mesa stations," said Hartwig. "However, there is a greater need in the city and fire stations on the highway can come to the aid of the surrounding towns much more quickly."

Hartwig said when the stations were originally built, the mesa station was considered to be at the edge of town and at the time that was a useful placement, but now, with the town's expansion, it is ineffective.

"I'm committed to improving services here," Hartwig said. "I believe that the way to build the fire station here we've needed for a long time is through a revenue source like this."

The revenue collected through FP5 will not necessarily stay in the town in which it was collected, but it will stay within the service region — which would be the South Desert Division, which includes Yucca Valley, Joshua Tree, Landers and Twentynine Palms.

After Hartwig's presentation, members of the audience spoke. Some were concerned about the lack of uniformity in the amount of property taxes going to the fire department between different communities. Others were asking the fire chief to provide more of an assurance that the money from this tax will benefit the town — something more concrete than a verbal promise.

Hartwig informed the public that while property taxes and their exact use are not completely under his command, he will do whatever he can to work toward increasing services to the area.

The fire department and board of supervisors will hold a 30-day protest process for the proposed tax. If 25 percent of property owners within the service area submit protest letters to the county, the fee will have to be voted on in a public election. If 50 percent or more submit letters of protest, then the expansion will be terminated.

Public notices will be mailed to all parcel owners on Sept. 14 and protests are due by the end of a public hearing to begin at 10 a.m. Oct. 16 at the county government center in San Bernardino. The latest information on how to submit a protest form will be posted through a link at sbcfire.org

Next week's meeting of the Lucerne Valley/Johnson Valley Municipal Advisory Council will feature an extended discussion of the proposed San Bernardino County fire tax.

The MAC meeting will be held at 5 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 16, at the Lucerne Valley Community Center, 33187 Highway 247 East, Lucerne Valley.

San Bernardino County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig and Deputy Chief John Chamberlin will be on hand to explain this FP-5 Service Area assessment of all parcels in unincorporated areas of the county. The cost would be \$157.26 per year and can increase by 3 percent annually.

The proposed tax can be defeated if more than 50 percent of affected property owners protest when notices are mailed out. If at least 25 percent of affected property owners protest, the tax will have to be placed on the ballot.

There will be at least 15 minutes set aside for questions from the MAC board and at least 30 minutes set aside for questions from residents. The meeting also will feature the swearing in of new MAC member Harriet Brashear.

# County fire faces financial Hobson's choice

WONDER VALLEY — After burning through most of a \$43 million reserve fund in four years, county fire officials have found themselves faced with a financial Hobson's choice, raise revenue by increasing fire assessments or cut costs by closing stations.

This has left property owners in Wonder Valley with a similarly difficult set of alternatives, see their annual fire protection assessment rise from \$35 to \$157.26 or lose the fire protection services, which currently consist of a fire crew stationed in Twentynine Palms, they still have.

At stake is a proposed expansion of Service Zone FP-5, which would take Wonder Valley out of Service Zone FP-4 and create a uniform annual \$157.26 per parcel assessment to pay for county fire services.

Fire Chief Mark Hartwig and several other county fire officials faced a room full of unhappy Wonder Valley residents at a community meeting at the Wonder Valley Community Center on Wednesday, Aug. 8.

Hartwig wanted to discuss the need for more county fire revenue to close a large and continuing budget gap which forced him to spend down his reserve or cut services for the past four years.

Though he was asked several times how this happened, Hartwig only replied that he was given the choice of spending down the reserve or cutting services.

"That is the urgency with which I com to you today," he said, adding that he will not have enough left in reserves next year unless he sees a large increase in revenue.

"If I can't fund services, the only other option is to cut services," he said. "They is the urgency I come to you with today."

He suggested that the Wonder Valley fire crew, now housed in Twentynine Palms, might be lost if the new assessment is not approved.

Many in the audience, which numbered between 50 and 60, wanted to find out if and when the Wonder Valley fire station, closed because of concerns about water quality, would reopen.

When fire officials said they did not know if they would be able to reopen the station, many in the crowd took this to mean no, the station would not reopen.

The Wonder Valley fire station closed in 2017 after some firefighters assigned to the station complained about being exposed to unsafe water there. The water was reportedly found to be contaminated by more than a dozen substances, including arsenic, Chromium 6 and fluoride levels thousands of times too high. It was evacuated, and firefighters moved to the downtown Twentynine Palms station, on Sept. 22, 2017.

Hartwig also described a process by which property owners can protest the proposed new fire assessment and possibly force the issue to a vote.

If at least 25 percent of affected property owners submit protests, the issue will go to a vote and if more than 50 percent submit protests the proposal will be killed outright.

Public notices will be mailed to parcel owners on Sept. 14. They will have until Oct. 16 to walk in protest letters or until the close of business Oct. 15 to have their protest letters received in the mail.

The county board of supervisors will hold a public hearing on the matter at 10 a.m. Oct. 16 in the San Bernardino County Government Center, in the First Flood Covington Chamber.

#### FIRE TAX ASSESSMENT MEETINGS IN WONDER VALLEY AND YUCCA VALLEY

San Bernardino County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig presided over two Town Hall meetings in the Morongo Basin yesterday. The first, at 4:00 p.m., was at the Wonder Valley Community Center; the second was at 6:30 in the Yucca Valley Community Center. Hartwig was here to try to sell a proposed property tax increase of about \$157 a month to backfill budget shortfalls for the County Fire Department.

County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig warned the residents who turned out that the annual assessment was necessary for the continued survival of county fire services. "We must look at service cuts or raise revenue throughout the (fire protection) district," he said. Reporter Mike Lipsitz reports on the Wonder Valley meeting...

About 60 people turned out yesterday to hear from county fire personnel about the proposed expansion and per parcel tax. The expansion would bring almost all of the county's unincorporated communities as well as Yucca Valley into Fire Protection District 5, a total of 19,000 square miles. The proposal comes in response to a \$29.3 million budget shortfall that county fire is grappling to manage. The shortfall is not new. In recent years the department has relied on bailouts from the board of supervisors and has spent down reserves from \$43 million to less than \$4 million in as many years.

The future of the now closed Wonder Valley Fire Station was a chief concern for many at yesterday's meeting. That station was closed more than a year ago because, according to county fire, of contaminated water there. Hartwig said dealing with the water issue and reopening the station was something the department wants to see, but the current climate doesn't allow any guarantees. Property owners can protest and theoretically kill the plan in an upcoming special protest vote.

After visiting Wonder Valley Wednesday to explain the proposed expansion into the county's Fire Protection District 5, County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig went to Yucca Valley where his message was the same. Managing editor Tami Roleff attended the Yucca Valley meeting, where Hartwig said Yucca Valley residents would benefit from the proposed expansion...

The county fire department is funded through property taxes, contracts with other cities for fire protection, and \$17 million from the county's general fund. (The amount of property taxes collected for the fire department varies by city; 22 percent of Yucca Valley property taxes go to the fire department, while it's only 10 percent

from Joshua Tree property taxes, and 3 percent from Wonder Valley property taxes.) That's not enough though; the county fire department has had to spend \$12 million from its reserve fund for the past several years to meet expenses. County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig said last night that if the proposed expansion is not approved by property owners, services will be cut, although specific cuts were not mentioned at this time.

But if the expansion into Fire Protection District 5 is approved, Hartwig said it is his priority—and that of County Supervisor James Ramos—to have two new fire stations built in Yucca Valley, which would include relocating Station 42 from the Mesa to the center of Yucca Valley. The fire department would still request the \$17 million from the county even after the expansion, but instead of using it for expenses, the fire department would go toward the cost of Yucca Valley's new fire stations.

The expansion plan is structured so that it will automatically go into effect unless 25 percent of affected property owners throughout the county submit a protest form. If they do, the proposal will go on the ballot as a voter initiative. If 50 percent submit the forms, the measure will be killed altogether. In JT we pay all kinds of taxes, but the quality of service is questionable. Taxing is one thing, but can you justify your response to emergency. How quickly can you get to an emergency on roads that are not paved and have no street signs. That's my question. Can you breakdown the annual cost to homeowners i.e. Truck, building maintenance, staff training and pay(if any). Etc. Time for change
